Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH) Program

Services Required for a PATH Program

- Case Management within 3-5 days of enrollment;
- within 3-5 days of enrollment;
- Medication management/prescription renewal within 3-5 days of enrollment;
- Referral to community behavioral health services, including support services; and
- Referral to primary health and dental services, job training, education services, and housing services.

Elective Services for a PATH Program

- Screening and diagnostic treatment;
- Habilitation and rehabilitation;
- Community behavioral health including support;
- Primary health services, job training, education services; and
- Supportive residential services

SSI/SSDI Outreach Access and Recovery (SOAR)

Program designed to increase access to:

- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and
- Social Security Disability Income (SSDI).

Eligibility requirements:

- Adults experiencing homelessness or at risk;
- Who cannot afford market-rate rent with current income; and
- Have a mental illness, medical impairment, and/or co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorder

Montana Coordinated Entry Systems (CES)

Goal: reduce burden on people/households in a housing crisis.

Objective: identifies the most appropriate housing resource to facilitate a rapid and permanent exit from homelessness, while prioritizing the most vulnerable households for housing.

Eligibility: a person at risk of homelessness or experiencing crisis of homelessness

Why Would My Program Seek to Become a “State Approved” Chemical Dependency Program?

- Access to county alcohol tax funds for SUD and Co-Occurring Services
- Able to provide the required alcohol education required for DUI convictions
- Eligible for SUD Contract / Task Order for Non-Medicaid SUD services

Frequently Asked Questions Cont...

What Is the Process for Becoming a “State Approved” Chemical Dependency Program?

- Complete the State Approval Application and submit to CD Bureau
 - List and licensure of staff, Org Chart, Board of Directors
 - Copy of Policy and Procedures addressing ARM 37.27.101 through 37.27.926; CFR 42 and 45
 - If applicable, Copy of Health Care Facility License for inpatient and residential programs
 - Documentation demonstrating local need for each county seeking state approval
 - Projected services for each county seeking state approval
- Provisional State Approval Determined by CD Bureau
- Program Schedules Site Visit with QAD – required for Full State Approval
- Full State Approval Determined by QAD
